
- Continued with bus replacement program, receiving 7 new buses in 2024-2025

CELEBRATING OUR LEARNING...

Divisional PD Day

The Sunrise School Divisional Professional Development Day took place on October 18, 2025, with over 800 employees in attendance. The day was hosted at the Brokenhead River Community Hall and at various sites in the Beausejour area. The morning was highlighted by keynote speaker, Kevin Lamoureux, from the University of Winnipeg Faculty of Education. The afternoon saw staff across all employee groups attending professional learning sessions on a variety of topics.



Cell Phone Usage

The 2024-25 school year saw the implementation of Provincially mandated cell phone restrictions. We are pleased to share that Sunrise procedure IJNDD – Personal Digital Devices, was well received by schools. Both students and staff reported the directive was responsible for an increase in on-task time learning time and healthier relationships with classmates and peers.

Provincial Mamàhtawisiwin Resource

Sunrise Schools continue to focus on the implementation of the provincial document, Mamàhtawisiwin – The Wonder We are Born With, which is intended to support educators, by helping them deepen their understanding and progress along a path of truth and reconciliation in their schools, classrooms and communities. This includes using provincially allocated funds to invite Elders and Knowledge Keepers into our schools to share with students and staff. Our schools should be proud of the work they are doing around Indigenous Education.

Treaty Training



On April 21, Sunrise School Division hosted Treaty Training sessions for teachers at the Manitoba Museum, Lower Fort Garry, and Turtle Lodge. With guidance from Elders and Knowledge Keepers, participants explored the history and significance of Treaties in Manitoba. Building on this learning, bus drivers and clinicians attended the Powerview Graduation Pow Wow on June 6. In addition to experiencing this powerful celebration of Indigenous identity—once banned under the Indian Act—staff also took part in sessions focused on Treaty history. With 20% of Sunrise students identifying as Indigenous, these experiences support reconciliation, deepen cultural understanding, and honour the spirit of Treaty in daily practice.









Early Literacy Initiative

We made a major shift in 2024-25 in our divisional approach teaching literacy. This shift was a culmination of the work of our divisional Early Literacy Committee



comprised of early years teachers, administrators, psychologists, speech pathologists, program leaders and division principals. All K-2 teachers attended two professional development sessions with a focus on foundational literacy concepts including teaching phonological awareness (the ability to recognize and manipulate the sounds of spoken words) and phonics, in a manner that is explicit and systematic within the early years. This approach is based on the latest scientific research, is proven to be effective and is supported by the recent position statements from the Manitoba Pediatrician Society, Canadian Pediatric Society, and the Manitoba Association of School Psychologists. In addition, we piloted two universal screeners this year and will be prepared to train all Grade 1-3 teachers to implement the Acadience screener next year.

Mental Health Days at Schools

The well being of students in Sunrise is supported by a wide range of strategies ranging from student activities to staffing and training. Our schools offer a diverse selection activities beyond extra-curricular sports and include drama, board games, student leader groups, and school spirit event to name a few. Students experience a variety of programs such as Project 11, Zones of Regulation, and Kids in the Know in addition to the P.E./Health Curriculum. Staffing supports include School Guidance/Counsellors, Social Workers, Psychologists and a Mental Health worker. We are committed to continuing to provide ASIST (Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training) and Non-Violent Crisis Intervention (NCI) for staff.

3rd Annual Sunrise Unified Sporting Event

The 3rd Annual Sunrise Unified Sporting Event was held May 23, 2025, at the Sunrise Education Centre in Beausejour. This inclusive event brought together middle and senior years students—with and without intellectual disabilities—for a day of connection, celebration, and sport.

Participants took part in a variety of activities, including basketball, soccer, bocce ball, sprints, modified javelin, and shot put. Additional highlights included a lively dance party, hula hooping, and bubble-blowing stations that added to the fun and festive atmosphere.

We were pleased to welcome students from our neighbouring Whiteshell School Division, along with strong representation from several Sunrise schools: Lac du Bonnet Senior School, École Edward Schreyer School, Whitemouth School, Anola School, École Powerview School, Oakbank Elementary, and Springfield Middle School.

A special thank you goes to the outstanding student volunteers from École Edward Schreyer School, who helped run the event stations with energy and care. One of the most heartwarming moments was hearing students' names called over the loudspeaker, followed by cheers and applause from the crowd—a moment of pride and joy for all.

The event fostered new friendships and meaningful memories, and we look forward to hosting the 4th Annual Sunrise Unified Sporting Event at the Sunrise Education Centre in the 2025–2026 school year!



Youth Parliament:

Nearly 200 students from five Sunrise schools gathered at Cooks Creek Community Centre on May 7 and 8 for the annual Youth Parliament. In this mock parliamentary event, students debated bills on topics like healthcare, social media, and the justice system while developing public speaking and critical thinking skills. First launched in 1955 as the Springfield Boys Parliament, the event was renamed in the 1970s following a push for gender inclusion. Since 2015, it has been proudly supported by Sunrise School Division, allowing more students to take part in this longstanding tradition.



Esports

The École Dugald School (ÉDS) Lavender Dragons had an impressive 3rd place finish at the Esport Canada EDU Dog Sled National Minecraft Competition!



This national event included builds from the top 9 scholastic-teams from across the country, and team members Kylah Thompson, Addison Willoughby, Danika MacLean, Brea Suszczynski, and Libby Janz stood out for their creativity, teamwork, and cultural understanding as they tackled one of the most unique and meaningful esport challenges of the year.

EDS sent two Rocket League teams to the Esport Canada EDU Scholastic National '25. a National tournament with U15 teams from all across the country. They competed against students up to Grade 9 from across Canada and our Red Dragons (Eric Poirier, Isaac Suderman, and Brennan Kapkey) placed second in Canada, and our Black Dragons (Ashton Chartrand, Jake Dyck, Everett Holberg, and Liam Nault) placed second in the Consolation bracket. On March 22nd, the Manitoba School Esports Association hosted the 2025 Middle Years Brawlhalla Scholastic Provincial Finals esports tournament at École Dugald School. The ÉDS Gym was transformed into the ultimate esports arena for the teams from across the province.
